

Citing sources in the *reference section* of your paper

References are cited in the reference section of your paper to enable your readers to identify and retrieve the original sources of information you used to support what you wrote in your paper. It should be complete enough to help people read the source in its complete and original form. Your reference list is alphabetized by the first author of the article.

Journal article, one author:

Kagan, K. (1996). Three pleasing ideas. *American Psychologist*, *51*, 901-908.

Journal article, multiple authors:

Mayne, T.J., Norcross, J.C., & Sayette, M.A. (1994). Admission requirements, acceptance rates, and financial assistance in clinical psychology programs: Diversity across the practice-research continuum. *American Psychologist*, *49*, 806-811.

Magazine article:

Papp, P. (1997, Jan/Feb). Listening to the system. *Family Therapy Networker*, *21*, 52-58.

Entire book:

Walter, J. L., & Peller, J. E. (1992). *Becoming solution-focused in brief therapy*. New York: Brunner/Mazel.

Book, 3rd edition:

Prochaska, J. O., & Norcross, J. C. (1999). *Systems of psychotherapy: A transtheoretical analysis* (4th ed.). Pacific Grove, CA: Brooks/Cole.

Edited book:

Wilson, J. P., & Lindy, J. D. (Eds.). (1994). *Countertransference in the treatment of PTSD*. New York: Guilford.

Chapter in an edited book:

May, R. (1989). Black and impotent: The life of Mercedes. In D. Wedding & R. J. Corsini (Eds.), *Case studies in psychotherapy* (pp. 165-176). Itasca, IL: Peacock.

Book written and published by group:

American Psychiatric Association. (2000). *Desk reference to the diagnostic criteria from DSM-IV-TR*. Washington, DC: Author.

Web page:

Slattery, J. (2002, January 25). *What's after graduation?* Retrieved on September 25, 2002, from <http://psy1.clarion.edu/jms/later.html>

Web page with a group author:

Clarion University Psychology Department. (2003). *Writing clearly and well*, Retrieved on May 17, 2004, from <http://psy1.clarion.edu/jms/writing.html>

Web pages with no author or no date (if there are several dates, use the most recent one):

My own experience. (n.d.). Retrieved on May 17, 2004, from <http://members.ozemail.com.au/~kap/myex.html>

This would be cited in the text of your paper as ("My own experience," n.d.) because it is an article, chapter or web page. If it were a book, the title would be italicized.

Internet articles, also published in a print journal, but read on the internet (as opposed to an on-line database)
